
Holy Week – Tuesday 7th April 2020 – A meditation

For him, like so many of us, he married, had children, painted and expected a long and happy married life. That wonderful Radio 4 contributor Rabbi Lionel Blue once said, 'If you want to make God laugh, tell him your plans!' Why would Monet attach the subtitle 'Forgetting self' to this painting? Art experts see this as an extraordinary painting that looks beyond death, away from selfishness, to what lies beyond. As Jesus approaches the cross and it gets ever closer, we see just how unselfish he is. As the pressure, boredom and fatigue currently build up, let us look into this painting and pray for the essence of Christlike unselfishness as we walk the way of the cross.
