The inauguration of Joe Biden this week as the next President of the USA brought this characterful organ work to mind. Charles Ives wrote 'Variations on America' in 1891 when he was just seventeen. The tune 'America' (which you will all recognise) was the de facto anthem of the United States when he wrote this youthfully exuberant piece. Some claim it is a parody; others that it is a serious study by a young man in the art of variation. Whatever he intended, it certainly contains much invention and humour! It also demonstrates Ives' early use of bitonality, where the music has two different key signatures at the same time, creating an uneasy and jarring effect. Ives wrote the piece for July 4 celebrations, and the bitonality is used in part to evoke two marching bands playing close to each other, but performing in different keys! This short work contains many different influences and dance styles - barbershop, jazz, a Scherzo, a March and a Polonaise - and you occasionally feel as if you are being wrenched from one place to the next. The finale, with its extremely virtuosic pedal part, demonstrates how accomplished Ives was on the organ at such a tender age. After the initial performance, however, his father would only let him perform some of the variations. He deemed the bitonal sections "unsuitable for church performance – they upset the elderly ladies and made the little boys laugh and get noisy!" I wonder whether 130 years on the reaction would be any different?!
