January is often a time to take stock, to make new resolutions and to prepare for what lies ahead. Certainly, this last week for me has been full of meetings and the need to put dates into the 2024 diary. Lots of good intentions too......

On the 12th January we remember Aelred of Hexham and Abbot of Rievaulx (1167) and on the 13th January we remember Hilary, Bishop of Poitiers, (367). Aelred was an English Cistercian monk and abbot, famous for his writings, and a traveller who wrote several books addressed to King Henry II, advising him on how to be a good King. (It was Henry II who fell out with Thomas à Becket.) Rievaulx Abbey in North Yorkshire, built in 1132, was one of the great abbeys in England until it was seized in 1538 under Henry VIII. Hilary of Poitiers (310 -367) was a Doctor of the Church and a great writer and mediator between the emerging church and the state. Married with a family, he was elected Bishop of Poitiers for his wisdom and sound leadership.

The church calendar is full of people like these, who are part of our 2000-year-old Christian history. I sometimes wonder which new people will be included in the church calendar in years to come.

Poem of the Week

This beautiful poem by William Blake, and a favourite of mine, is a good reflection for the beginning of the year. The Divine Image is a poem from Songs of Innocence which was first published in 1789, followed by Songs of Experience in 1794. It portrays an ideal world, presenting four traditional Christian virtues (Mercy, Pity, Peace, and Love) which exist in the human heart, connecting them with God. William Blake was a poet, painter, printmaker and writer of prophetic works who was largely unrecognised during his lifetime but is considered today to be amongst our greatest poets, perhaps best known for his poem Jerusalem, now famously sung as a hymn. Many considered him mad but he always believed he was touched by the hand of God. I often hope that the Christian virtues Blake describes are at the heart of my life.

To Mercy, Pity, Peace, and Love All pray in their distress; And to these virtues of delight Return their thankfulness.

For Mercy, Pity, Peace, and Love Is God, our father dear, And Mercy, Pity, Peace, and Love Is Man, his child and care.

For Mercy has a human heart, Pity a human face, And Love, the human form divine, And Peace, the human dress.

Then every man, of every clime, That prays in his distress, Prays to the human form divine, Love, Mercy, Pity, Peace.

And all must love the human form, In heathen, Turk, or Jew; Where Mercy, Love, and Pity dwell There God is dwelling too.
