#### Advance notice - Lent, Holy Week and Easter

Easter is early this year, falling on 31<sup>st</sup> March. Lent begins on **Ash Wednesday** (14<sup>th</sup> February) with a service of Holy Communion with Ashing at 7pm in the White Tower. All are welcome.

This year we shall be holding a **Lent Lunch** after the 11am service each Sunday. This will be a simple meal of soup, bread and cheese. On the basis of 20 people attending each Sunday, the plan is to ask five or six people each week to make four portions of soup to the same recipe and bring them to the Tower, where we will combine them in one soup warmer. The chapel will pay for the soup, bread and cheese but we are hoping for a donation of £5 per head, all of which will go to a charity. The maximum number each week will be 20 and we shall be asking you to sign up week by week. You may not be able to attend all these Lent Lunches, but please try to come along to least one. As well as being something special for Lent, it should also be fun.

# Poem of the week: Another Year is Dawning, by Frances Ridley Havergal

Frances Ridley Havergal (1836 –79) was an English religious poet and hymnwriter, perhaps best known for her hymn *Take My Life and Let it Be*. She wrote hymn melodies and religious tracts, as well as works for children. Frances Havergal was born into an Anglican family at Astley in Worcestershire. Her father, William Henry Havergal (1793–1870), was a clergyman, writer, composer, and hymnwriter. Her brother, Henry East Havergal, was a Church of England priest and an organist.

When she was five, her father moved to the Rectory of St. Nicholas, Worcester. A short stay in Germany followed. Her academic achievements were extensive, embracing several modern languages, together with Greek and Hebrew. On her return to England, she was confirmed in Worcester Cathedral in 1853. She left Worcester in 1860, when her father resigned from St. Nicholas, and she lived at different periods in Leamington and at Caswell Bay, Swansea, with visits to Switzerland, Scotland and North Wales. She led a quiet life, not enjoying consistent good health and dying of peritonitis aged only 42 in 1879.

Her poem *Another Year is Dawning*, written in 1874, provides an insight into her life of dedication and her sense of service to God. For all her undoubted learning, she here shows herself able to express profound thoughts in simple and direct language, using a straightforward rhyme scheme. The poem was set to music by Samuel S. Wesley (1810–76), the tune *Aurelia*, being probably more familiar to us as a setting of the hymn *The Church's One Foundation*, written by Samuel Stone in 1866.

#### Another Year is Dawning.

Another year is dawning, Dear Father, let it be, In working, or in waiting, Another year with Thee; Another year of leaning Upon thy loving breast, Another year of trusting, Of quiet, happy rest.

Another year of mercies, Of faithfulness and grace; Another year of gladness In the shining of Thy face; Another year of progress, Another year of praise, Another year of proving Thy presence all the days.

Another year of service, Of witness for Thy love; Another year of training For holier work above. Another year is dawning, Dear Father, let it be On earth, or else in heaven Another year for Thee.
