Poem of the week

Emily Dickinson (1830-96) was an American poet who was little known during her lifetime but has since become recognised as one of America's most significant female poets. Almost all of her work, including this week's poem, was published after her death. She never married and lived most of her life as a recluse, becoming known locally as something of an eccentric, with a penchant for wearing white and a reluctance to greet people. In later life, she rarely left her bedroom.

Her poems are often associated with nature, life and mortality, and have their own unconventional capitalisation and punctuation, with short lines. Opinions vary as to which is her most famous and meaningful poem. Her



much-loved poem *Hope* certainly stands out as a mark of her greatness but I have chosen *This World is not Conclusion*, first published in 1896, as it is a suitable reflection for the season of Advent. The poem uses twin similes to evoke all that's beautiful and ungraspable about the afterlife. Whatever 'stands beyond' this world is invisible, as Music, but positive, as Sound. In other words, the afterlife can't be perceived with the eyes any more than can music. One commentator wrote about the poem: 'Emily Dickinson explores the tension between faith and doubt. The speaker intuits that this world isn't the only one and that people go on to another world after they die. But their belief stands on shaky ground. Though many have tried, no one can really prove the existence of an afterlife, so it's hard to get comfortable with the idea, and doubt gnaws at them.'

A Species stands beyond— Invisible, as Music-But positive, as Sound— It beckons, and it baffles— Philosophy, dont know— And through a Riddle, at the last— Sagacity, must go-To guess it, puzzles scholars— To gain it, Men have borne **Contempt of Generations** And Crucifixion, shown— Faith slips—and laughs, and rallies— Blushes, if any see-Plucks at a twig of Evidence— And asks a Vane, the way— Much Gesture, from the Pulpit— Strong Hallelujahs roll— Narcotics cannot still the Tooth That nibbles at the soul—

ONE-OFF DONATION. You can make a one-off donation online by clicking on **this link** or pointing the camera of your phone or tablet at this QR Code

and following the link which then pops up. If you are eligible for Gift Aid, please tick the relevant box and provide the required details on the CAF Bank online form. These two links are also available on our website **here**.

DIRECT DEBIT. It is also possible to use the links above to set up a Direct Debit if that is what you prefer.

If you are an eligible UK taxpayer using the CAF Bank website via the links above to make either a one-off donation or to set up a Direct Debit, please remember to tick the Gift Aid box on the CAF site form. This method of Gift Aid payment does entail some delay in our receiving the benefit – hence our preference for Standing Orders. Gift Aid is available only to eligible UK taxpayers.
