

The Chapels Royal of St Peter ad Vincula and St John the Evangelist HM Tower of London

Dear friends,

Greetings to you all in this season of Epiphany, when we celebrate the revelation of Jesus as the Messiah and Saviour of all people.

For those of you attending our current single 9.30am service on Sundays in the Chapel of St John the Evangelist in the White Tower, you will now notice the entrance and part of the walls of the Chapel of St Peter ad Vincula boarded up. All the furniture has been removed from inside while the works proceed to make the Chapel accessible, sound and secure for the coming years. It is of course frustrating for all of us not to be able to worship in the Chapel for these three months or so, but the work had to be done at some point, so please bear with us. It will be especially welcome finally to have the Chapel made accessible to those with mobility issues.

Please note that the East Gate to the Tower (nearest to St Katharine Dock) is out of action until the end of February for both vehicles and pedestrians. The only entry is by the West Gate next to the Tower Gift Shop. Those attending our 9.30am services will be admitted from 9.00 am and directed to the Middle Drawbridge entrance.

To repeat Roger's plea in last week's newsletter, those of you



who are attending regularly are encouraged to get a **Chapel pass**. This facilitates your entry to services. All that is required is for you to let us have your name and address, accompanied by a passport photograph with your name clearly written on the back (and if possible, a stamped address envelope), and our Chapel Administrator Debbie will return your laminated pass to you as soon as possible. You can either drop off a passport photo at the service on Sunday or email it with the other details as an attachment to Debbie (<u>Deborah.Corbett@hrp.org.uk</u>).

Again, as Roger mentioned last week, do consider increasing your donation to the Chapel, or start a regular donation by standing order or direct debit. It is also possible to make a one-off donation. During the closure period of the Chapel of St Peter ad Vincula, we expect a significant reduction in weekly congregations and, therefore, a considerable reduction in our service collections, as well as, of course, the money normally left by our many Tower visitors in the box by the Chapel door. You will appreciate that we rely heavily on these funds for the upkeep of the Chapel and payments to our exceptional choir, amongst other costs. I hope you will be able to help. There is information at the end of this Newsletter to assist you in this.

<u>Prayer</u>



In place of our weekly poem, we have decided to offer a weekly prayer. Our first is by Dietrich Bonhoeffer (1906-45), who was a German Lutheran pastor, theologian and anti-Nazi dissident. He was a principal founding member of the Confessing Church, which refused to compromise with Nazi ideology and offered sustained resistance to the régime. His writings on Christianity's role in the secular world have become widely influential; his 1937 book The Cost of Discipleship is described as a modern classic. Bonhoeffer's staunch resistance to the Nazi dictatorship included to Adolf Hitler's vocal opposition euthanasia programme and the genocidal persecution of Jews. He was arrested in April 1943 by the Gestapo and

imprisoned at Tegel Prison for 1¹/₂ years. Later, he was transferred to Flossenbürg concentration camp. Bonhoeffer was accused of being associated with the 20th July 1944 attempt to assassinate Hitler and was tried along with other accused plotters. He was hanged on 9th April 1945 during the collapse of the Nazi régime.

Bonhoeffer's poem is written from the depths of misery, perhaps calling to mind the first line of Psalm 130 "Out of the deep have I called unto thee, O Lord : Lord, hear my voice." It also echoes Psalm 70, which reads as follows in the King James (Authorised) Version:

1. Haste thee, O God, to deliver me : make haste to help me, O Lord.

- 2. Let them be ashamed and confounded that seek after my soul : let them be turned backward and put to confusion that wish me evil.
- 3. Let them for their reward be soon brought to shame : that cry over me, There, there.
- 4. But let all those that seek thee be joyful and glad in thee : and let all such as delight in thy salvation say alway, The Lord be praised.
- 5. As for me, I am poor and in misery : haste thee unto me, O God.
- 6. Thou art my helper and my redeemer : O Lord, make no long tarrying.

It is interesting to note that, although Bonhoeffer had every reason to invoke God's wrath on those who had grievously wronged him, and who would shortly take his life, he does not express the thoughts of the writer of verses 2-3 of Psalm 70 in calling for them to be punished. Instead, he focuses on inviting God's consolation and strength in his own troubles and asking that his loved ones be kept safe, as well as seeking forgiveness for any wrongs that he has done to others. This selfless approach to prayer is typical of Bonhoeffer. Rather than seeking vengeance, he simply places his fate in God's hands.

Bonhoeffer's poem:

O Lord God, Great is the misery that has come upon me; My cares would overwhelm me, I know not what to do. O God, be gracious unto me and help me. Grant me strength to bear what you send and let not fear rule over me. As a loving Father, take care of my loved ones

O merciful God, forgive me all the sins I have committed against you, and against my fellows. I trust in your grace and commit my life wholly into your hands. So, do with me as seems best to you and as is best for me. Whether I live or die, I am with you, and you are with me, my God. Lord, I wait for your salvation.

<u>Music</u>

One of the things that we necessarily miss in our current Sunday services in the White Tower is the pleasure of hearing our wonderful choir under the direction of the Master of Music Colm Carey. They have, however, been busy on our behalf, recording pieces for us which they would otherwise have sung in our usual 11 o'clock services. This week they have provided two pieces, one by Benjamin Britten and one by Jacob Handl, on which Colm has provided the following background:

A New Year Carol (from Friday Afternoons) - Benjamin Britten (1913-76)

This miniature, written for children in 1936, comes from a collection of twelve songs titled *Friday Afternoons*. It is unclear what the chorus of the text (which is anonymous) symbolises. Some think it refers to the Welsh custom of bringing fresh water with evergreen sprigs as a New Year gift. Levy Dew may be a bastardisation of the French 'Levez Dieu', alluding to the raising of the host during the Eucharistic. The 'seven bright gold wires' and 'bugles' may be drawn from images in the Book of Revelation, referring to candles and trumpets of the apocalypse. Whatever the meaning, the simplicity of Britten's unison melody is very moving as it ushers a New Year in.

Here we bring new water from the well so clear, For to worship God with, this happy New Year. Sing levy dew, sing levy dew, the water and the wine; The seven bright gold wires and the bugles that do shine.

Sing reign of Fair Maid, with gold upon her toe, Open you the West Door, and turn the Old Year go. Sing levy dew...

Sing reign of Fair Maid, with gold upon her chin, Open you the East Door, and let the New Year in. Sing levy dew...

Omnes de Saba Venient - Jacob Handl (1550-91)

Jacob Handl was a Slovenian composer who sang in the Imperial Chapel of Maximilian II before becoming Kantor of Saint Jan na Brezhu in Prague. His compositions are always very characterful, and he was criticised in his own lifetime for writing music that was too difficult to sing!! It is true that the contrapuntal complexity of his music is very advanced for its time, and people never like change...! Handl was manifesting the evolution of composition towards the Baroque era of music which began around 1600, and I suspect the sophistication of his writing befuddled those who were happy with the serenely beautiful works of the high renaissance.

This short piece sets text from Isaiah Ch. 60 v.6 - 'And they from Saba will come, bringing gold and frankincense, and announcing the praise of the Lord. Alleluia.' It is very typical of Handl. After a declamatory opening it bursts into vibrant polyphony where five different voice parts throw Handl's musical motifs around before coming to a strong homophonic close with the final iteration of 'Alleluia'.

Omnes de Saba venient aurum et thus deferentes et laudem Domino annuntiantes. Alleluja.

All they from Saba will come, bringing gold and frankincense, and announcing the praise of the Lord. Alleluia.


climbed in aid of Muscular Dystrophy UK, a charity close to
