Thought for the Day

Last Monday 27th January was Holocaust Memorial Day, which this year marked the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz. Bishop Sarah participated in a memorial event at Lambeth Palace at which she, with others present, lit candles not only in memory of the millions of victims of the Nazi atrocities but also as symbols of hope and of light in a dark world. Here you can see Bishop Sarah with other representatives.



Here Bishop Sarah is seen lighting her candle, set in a porcelain container made especially for this event by the potter and author <u>Edmund de Waal CBE</u>, who told the story of the destruction of many members of his own family in his book *The Hare with Amber Eyes*.



All participants emphasised our need to face down racist prejudice and inflammatory rhetoric from individuals, groups and national leaders. A central theme of this event, at which speakers included the remarkable Holocaust survivor Martin Stern MBE and Daniela Abraham, a representative of the Roma and Sinti people (many of whom were murdered at Auschwitz and elsewhere), was the need for renewed vigilance against prejudice, coupled with hope that good would prevail over evil. The Church of England has embraced the following prayer, written for this 80th anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz death camp by the Council of Christians and Jews who organised this event:

Eternal God,
we come before You
to remember the victims of the Holocaust.
We lament the loss of six million Jews
who were killed in the Holocaust,
the millions of other victims of Nazi persecution,
and victims of all genocides.
As we remember and lament
all those whose lives have been lost,
help us to work for a better future today.
We pray for a day when all shall be free
to live in peace, unity and love. Amen.

Prayer of the week



H G Wells is known as a major literary figure of the 20th Century, not least for his science fiction works such as *The Time Machine* (1895), *The Invisible Man* (1897), *The First Men in the Moon* (1900) and *The War of the Worlds* (1898). Wells was a revered futurist who predicted modern warfare. No less a figure than Winston Churchill credited Wells with conceiving of the tank.

When only thirteen years old, Wells rejected religion and thereafter proclaimed his 'sturdy atheism.' Many people saw this as part of his futurism—Wells was an early adopter of the godless world that was coming. Soon there would be no believers. Then Wells found God. World War I changed his mind. Wells lost his faith in human progress and became convinced that God was the only answer. He wrote overtly evangelising works such as *Mr. Britling Sees It Through* (1916), *War and the Future* (1917) and *God the Invisible King* (1917).

We tend to assume that WWI led to a general rejection of religion, especially amongst intellectuals. H G Wells is an exception.

The prayer reproduced here reads as though it was taken down by dictation from an impromptu prayer session. It is somewhat rambling, and the punctuation is idiosyncratic. Nevertheless, the sense that humanity has no option but to place itself in God's hands still comes across powerfully.

Oh God, our leader and our master and our friend, forgive our imperfections and our little motives, take us and make us one with thy great purpose, use us and do not reject us, make us all servants of thy kingdom weave our lives into thy struggle to conquer and to bring peace and union to the world.

We are small and feeble creatures, we are feeble in speech, feebler still in action, nevertheless let but thy light shine upon us, and there is not one of us who cannot be lit by thy fire and who cannot lose himself in thy salvation. Take us into thy purposes, O God, let thy Kingdom come into our hearts and into this world.

Colm, our Master of Music, has provided the following notes on the music by Johannes Eccard (1533-1611) accompanying this week's Newsletter:

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple is a translation by the Victorian clergyman John Troutbeck of a poem by the 16th century German poet Johannes Eccard. It considers the presentation of Christ in the Temple. Eccard was a poet and musician who composed an epic amount of church music and this is one of his most well-loved works. Eccard often composed music for multiple voices and the rich, sonorous texture of this chorale-motet is a very good example of his style.

When to the temple Mary went,
And brought the Holy Child,
Him did the aged Simeon see,
As it had been revealed.
He took up Jesus in his arms
And blessing God he said:
In peace I now depart, my Saviour having seen,
The Hope of Israel, the Light of men.

Help now thy servants, gracious Lord,

That we may ever be
As once the faithful Simeon was,

Rejoicing but in Thee;
And when we must from earth departure take,

May gently fall asleep and with Thee wake.

and following the link which then pops up. If you are eligible for Gift Aid, please tick the relevant box and provide the required details on the CAF Bank online form. These two links are also available on our website **here**.

DIRECT DEBIT. It is also possible to use the links above to set up a Direct Debit if that is what you prefer.

If you are an eligible UK taxpayer using the CAF Bank website via the links above to make either a one-off donation or to set up a Direct Debit, please remember to tick the Gift Aid box on the CAF site form. This method of Gift Aid payment does entail some delay in our receiving the benefit – hence our preference for Standing Orders. Gift Aid is available only to eligible UK taxpayers.
