


# The Chapels Royal of St Peter ad Vincula and St John the Evangelist HM Tower of London

Dear friends,

And so it is that we begin another season of Lent, a time of traditional prayer, fasting and almsgiving. For many people, Lent simply means *giving something up* and if they're feeling particularly generous, they will give the money they would have spent on chocolate, wine, biscuits, etc to their favourite charity. There is nothing wrong with this and I will do as I always do in Lent and give up meat.

Barbara used to say to me, 'It would be far more penitential to give up your 'little coffees' which, for you, seem to make the world go round!' She was probably right. Although I will still give up meat, I have been trying to think about what I will 'take on' rather than 'give up'.

Over the years I have suggested reading a good book for Lent; one that's not too heavy, but informative and perhaps even a little challenging.



To that end I would like to recommend to you 'Living with the Psalms' by John Bell. Bell is a writer, broadcaster and musician, as well as a prolific hymn-writer, with a passion for social justice and inclusion. He was part of the Iona Community for over 40 years and regularly speaks on Radio 4's Thought for the Day. The book is described in this way:

'John explores the Psalms as they relate to daily life, drawing on stories and personal testimonies to help us to rejoice, grieve or draw encouragement from this most extraordinary and fascinating collection of sacred poems and songs'.

### Sunday Service details for 9<sup>th</sup> March 2025 The First Sunday in Lent

**0930** Holy Communion (The White Tower)

**Readings** 2 Corinthians 6: 1-10 Matthew 4: 1-11

Collect for The First Sunday in Lent O Lord, who for our sake didst fast forty days and forty nights; Give us grace to use such abstinence, that, our flesh being subdued to the Spirit, we may ever obey thy godly motions in righteousness and true holiness, to thy honour and glory, who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. Amen.

#### Prayer of the week

According to the Book of Common Prayer, the Collect, or prayer, for Ash Wednesday should be said every day in Lent. This prayer, written by Thomas Cranmer, replaced the Collect originally written for Ash Wednesday which specifically mentioned fasting. At the heart of Cranmer's prayer are the words 'who hatest nothing that thou hast made', reminding us that whatever we have done or failed to do, we believe that God is still reaching out to us because he forgives the sins of all those who are *penitent*, as the Collect reminds us.

Lent is a time of reflection, prayer and penitence but we must always remember that we are the other side of the Cross and Resurrection, which means that our sins are forgiven and we are redeemed. It was a tradition in many churches for people to learn this Collect by heart, something that you might consider doing during this season of Lent.

#### **Collect for Ash Wednesday**

Almighty and everlasting God, who hatest nothing that thou hast made, and dost forgive the sins of all them that are penitent; Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we worthily lamenting our sins, and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of thee, the God of all mercy, perfect remissions and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

#### Music: Miserere mei by William Byrd (Psalm 51, v.1)

This motet is part of Byrd's second collection of *Cantiones Sacrae* (Sacred Songs). In Protestant countries Latin texts were legal only in the context of private musical performance and not in the context of worship. As a covert Catholic himself (a risky thing for a member of the Chapel Royal), William Byrd (c.1542-1623) would have associated the well-known penitential Psalm 51 *Miserere mei* especially with the season of Lent and with remembrances for the dead. The text is a heartfelt plea for mercy, and the music reflects this powerfully. Byrd's setting of the psalm's opening verse comes from his second collection of *Cantiones Sacrae* published in 1591, all of them in five voice-parts rather than the now-standard four and having the associated richness of texture.

Miserere mei, Deus, secundum magnum misericordiam tuam ; Et secundum multitudinem miserationum tuarum, dele iniquitatem meam.

Have mercy upon me, O God, after thy great goodness: according to the multitude of thy mercies do away mine offences.

# The Tower of London: 2025 Poppies commemorative display to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of the Second World War.

### 6th May - 11th November 2025

See a new special commemorative display of ceramic poppies installed at the heart of the Tower of London to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of the Second World War.


The display will see nearly 30,000 of the original poppies, made for the 2014 installation, 'Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red', return to the Tower, marking the sacrifices made by so many during the Second World War.

The specially commissioned installation will resemble a 'wound' at the heart of the Tower, which was itself bombed during the Blitz. Poppies will pour across the lawn overlooked by the ancient White Tower, where the blood-red flowers will form a crater, with ripples flowing outwards.

The poppies are on loan from Imperial War Museums and were designed and made by the artist, Paul Cummins. The new display has been created by the designer, Tom Piper.
