In Lent we need to make time to weep and to acknowledge where we have gone wrong, whether individually or collectively. We need to make time to allow God to speak to us and restore us spiritually. In our busy and frenetic world, sparing just five minutes regularly to sit and listen and be quiet is a Lenten gift.

Chapel renovation



Lent Book

As I said in a previous newsletter, each year I like to suggest a book you might like to read for Lent; one that's not too heavy, but informative and perhaps even a little challenging. This year, I recommend to you **Living with the Psalms** by John Bell. Bell is a writer, broadcaster and musician, as well as a prolific hymn-writer, with a passion for social justice and inclusion. He was part of the Iona Community for over 40 years and regularly speaks on Radio 4's Thought for the Day. The book is described in this way:

'John explores the Psalms as they relate to daily life, drawing on stories and personal testimonies to help us to rejoice, grieve or draw encouragement from this most extraordinary and fascinating collection of sacred poems and songs'.

Collect for the Second Sunday in Lent

Almighty God, who seest that we have no power of ourselves to help ourselves; Keep us both outwardly in our bodies, and inwardly inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prayer of the week

St Richard was Bishop of Chichester for eight years in the mid-13th century, and was canonised in 1262. He is widely remembered today for his famous prayer, beloved of many people, which is also printed at the back of our chapel booklet. Written originally in Latin, one of its more recent translators into English used a very effective rhyming triplet: 'clearly', 'dearly' and 'nearly' at the end of the prayer. The prayer is often used at confirmation services and as the basis for reflection and more general prayer. Each line can be separated out and used as the basis for a wider set of prayers.

The Prayer of St Richard of Chichester

Thanks be to thee, my Lord Jesus Christ, for all the benefits thou hast given me, for all the pains and insults thou hast borne for me. O most merciful Redeemer, Friend and Brother, may I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, and follow thee more nearly, day by day. Amen.

Music

Sicut Cervus (Palestrina, c.1525-1594)

This motet exemplifies Palestrina's style and is one of his best-known pieces. The purity of harmonic language is coupled to a beauty of melodic contour and the words are painted throughout in a subtle but profound way. The four-part counterpoint evokes the gently flowing water that promises to satisfy the thirsty deer. The expansive lines in each part convey a deep sense of longing, beautifully sculpted to produce a perfect balance of musical construction and expression.
