

# The Chapels Royal of St Peter ad Vincula and St John the Evangelist HM Tower of London

# Dear friends,

This week's Newsletter is given over to the VE Day celebrations. Here at The Tower, 30,000 poppies have been loaned from the Imperial War Museum, and a small army of volunteers from different walks of life have worked day and night for two weeks to assemble them. The pictures below give you some idea of the work involved. Many of you may recall the poppies at the Tower in 2014.







Victory in Europe Day celebrates the formal acceptance by the World War II Allies of Germany's unconditional surrender of its armed forces on the 8<sup>th</sup> May 1945. The war would continue in Japan; it was Winston Churchill who said, 'We may allow ourselves a brief period of rejoicing as Japan remains unsubdued'.

Four days of remembrance have taken place, and we were delighted when HM The Queen came on Tuesday to plant the final poppy. The poppies will be here until Remembrance Sunday.

The chapel is very busy this month with weddings, baptisms and other events. We will continue our routine of 0930 services in the White Tower until **29**<sup>th</sup> **June** (please note the date) when the first service will take place back in St Peter ad Vincula. There will then follow two more Sundays in St Peter ad Vincula (6<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup> July) before the chapel closes for the summer.

Work on the new mobility access by the west door will not be complete by 29<sup>th</sup> June but we are assured that access into the chapel will be possible.

Two weddings and the baptism of Pippa and Will's son Theo have also taken place this week. Theo has been a very poorly child and I was delighted that he was well enough to be baptised. Many of you may recognise Will as a member of the choir. He will be back when St Peter ad Vincula reopens on 29<sup>th</sup> June



Thank you to everyone who has made a gallant effort to join us each Sunday morning - and not been defeated by the stairs!

We continue to pray for the outcome of the Papal Conclave and for the appointment of the new Archbishop of Canterbury.

### Poem of the week

The poem *In Retrospect* was written especially for the VE Day celebrations by the Poet Laureate, Simon Armitage. He read it to The Queen before she planted the last poppy here at The Tower, on Tuesday. Simon read it again at the Tuesday evening event in the Tower, to which 300 VIPs were invited, including nine veterans.



I had a long chat with Simon and a more pleasant man you couldn't wish to meet; he was charming to everyone. Simon was appointed Poet Laureate in May 2019. He is Professor of Poetry at the University of Leeds and lives in Holme Valley, West Yorkshire.

# In Retrospect

The world asks a great deal of the poppies, insists they carry the wounds of war and shoulder the weight of remembrance.

Such flimsy, wavering plants; we painted their flowers the colour of blood and punched dark holes in their heads as if bullets had passed through, then trimmed them with green sprigs of hope.

And from deep in the seeds we concocted the essence of sleep and dreams and resting-in-peace.

Almost weightless even in full bloom we made them souls, the poppies, souls of those who we lost, and - let it be said - those who we killed.

Poppies - nursed in darkness, nourished by dirt.

But for all their spindly roots, frail stalks
and papery petals - as easily smudged
as a butterfly wing —
they joggle into existence
again and again, unearthing themselves
in fallow fields and railway sidings,
on roundabouts, verges and no man's land,
from the brickwork of old chimneys and bridges
and cracks in the pavement.
They nod and they nag,
reminding us not to forget, flagging a red alert
as their crumpled petals unfold.
So, rightly, the poppies ask a great deal of the world.

### Music

# For Sunday 11th May - Lassus

Surrexit pastor Bonus - Orlande de Lassus, 1532-94

Orlande de Lassus was the most prolific composer of the Renaissance. He produced some 60 Masses, 100 Magnificats, an astonishing 500 motets as well as 100s of secular works. He was the most famous composer of his day, even surpassing the reputation of Palestrina. However, for some reason (perhaps because his output was so vast that nobody has had time to explore his complete oeuvre!) his legacy in modern times is fainter than it might be. In any case, he is a wonderful composer, as this little motet demonstrates.

The rising figure at the outset announces the Resurrection of the Good Shepherd while the subsequent descending motif depicts Jesus laying down his life for his sheep. Almost half of the motet is taken up by iterations of 'Alleluia' - the first time the word would have been heard liturgically since the last Sunday of Epiphany. The effect of 5 different voice parts singing it polyphonically is like a peal of bells, bringing the motet to a triumphant conclusion.

Surrexit pastor bonus, qui animam suam posuit pro ovibus suis, et pro grege suo mori dignatus est, alleluia.

The Good Shepherd has arisen, who laid down his life for his sheep, and deigned to die for his flock, alleluia.

# From Susie Hill (Soprano in the Choir)


My contribution to the newsletter is perhaps slightly unusual, but I hope it offers you a glimpse of my life outside singing at the Tower! I enjoy leading various music education projects in London and the Midlands, and every Monday I work in Tower Hamlets with the 25 choristers of St Peter's, London Docks. The chorister programme is unauditioned and open to all singers aged 7-11; we are particularly fortunate that St Peter's London Docks Primary School, where the majority of our singers are educated, greatly values music and the arts, contributing significantly to the choristers' enthusiasm and dedication. Whilst it is a small programme at the moment, we are working hard to build up a Parish Choir 'back row' and to restore the original 2-manual Walker organ. The church has lots of interesting history, including being the first Anglican mission to the poor of London. Whilst the Tower is closed, I'd highly recommend a visit if you are passing through Wapping! This recording of Copland's 'At the River' is a snippet from one of our recent Monday rehearsals, sung by the choristers and accompanied by the organ scholar, Louis.
