I am pleased that we had a memorable and well-attended Remembrance Sunday on 12th November, with many people staying on for coffee after the service.


Advent Sunday is on 3rd December and there will again be a traditional Advent Carol Service preparing us for the Advent season and the lead-up to Christmas.

Finally, it is impossible not to be aware of all that is going on in the Holy Land. These difficult times have raised many hard questions with no easy answers. The deaths of so many innocent children and vulnerable adults is terrible. I believe the time has come for a break in fighting, a ceasefire, which would allow time for food, fuel, water and medical supplies to be brought in, for hospitals to be resupplied and for people and, especially, tiny babies to be moved to safer areas. The small Christian community in Gaza, along with Christians in Israel, have asked for our prayers and where possible, our practical help. Along with the war in Ukraine, events in the Middle East are a constant focus both of our prayers in the chapel and our own private prayers. We yearn for peace to come soon and for there to be long-term plans to address the future of all those who live in the Holy Land.

## Poem of the week

Elizabeth Barrett, better known as Elizabeth Barrett Browning, began writing verses at the age of four and more formal poetry when she was eleven. Educated at home, she read widely and in different languages. However, she fell ill at 15 with a serious illness causing intense head and spinal pain with loss of mobility. The illness overshadowed her entire life and she became increasingly dependent on laudanum and morphine to reduce the pain. Her fragile health was later made worse by a tuberculous condition. In spite of her physical condition, she was a prolific writer of poetry and prose and became one of the most widely-admired poets in both England and the USA, even being considered for the post of Poet Laureate in 1850, after the death of Wordsworth, though she lost to Tennyson. The poet Robert Browning wrote to her in praise of her work and once they were eventually introduced, a long courtship resulted. This, however, and their subsequent private marriage in London, had to be kept secret from her father, whom Elizabeth knew would strongly disapprove of the match. (Once he found out, Elizabeth was indeed disinherited, as were all her siblings who married.) The couple moved to Italy in 1846 , soon after their honeymoon, and Elizabeth had a son at the age of 43 . Her failing health led to her early death in 1861, and she was buried in the English cemetery in Florence.
In the sonnet I have chosen, which speaks powerfully to those of us who are getting older, Barrett Browning writes about mutual love, suggesting that although everything about a person might change with age and we will inevitably alter, becoming physically frail, real love is eternal. Such love is a miracle and there is none greater. This is, I believe, how God would see us.

## If thou must love me..... Sonnet 14

If thou must love me, let it be for nought
Except for love's sake only. Do not say,
"I love her for her smile-her look-her way
Of speaking gently, -for a trick of thought
That falls in well with mine, and certes brought
A sense of pleasant ease on such a day"-
For these things in themselves, Belovèd, may
Be changed, or change for thee - and love, so wrought,
May be unwrought so. Neither love me for
Thine own dear pity's wiping my cheeks dry:
A creature might forget to weep, who bore
Thy comfort long, and lose thy love thereby!
But love me for love's sake, that evermore
Thou mayst love on, through love's eternity.
