Poem of the week

Arthur Hugh Clough's best-known poem, 'Say not, the struggle naught availeth', composed in 1849 in Rome, was made famous by Winston Churchill, who quoted its last two stanzas in a radio broadcast at a dark time during the Second World War. By February 1941, all Britain's allies in Europe were defeated, but the United States was sending Britain armaments, hence the aptness of 'westward, look' in the last line. This poem struck me this week as I was thinking about, and praying for, the people of Ukraine.

'Say not, the struggle naught availeth'

Say not, the struggle naught availeth,
The labour and the wounds are vain,
The enemy faints not, nor faileth,
And as things have been they remain.
If hopes were dupes, fears may be liars;
It may be, in yon smoke concealed,
Your comrades chase e'en now the fliers,
And, but for you, possess the field.
For while the tired waves, vainly breaking
Seem here no painful inch to gain,
Far back through creeks and inlets making,
Came silent, flooding in, the main.
And not by eastern windows only,
When daylight comes, comes in the light,
In front the sun climbs slow, how slowly,
But westward, look, the land is bright.

As part of HRP's plans to celebrate HM The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, they are creating a Queen's Garden at the Tower of London inspired by Her Majesty's 1953 coronation gown.

The Queen's Garden is made up of Meadow flowers, topiary, perennials, bulbs and ornamental grass. The display includes twelve cast glass forms by artist Max Jacquard representing the national emblems in Norman Hartnell's coronation gown design as well as a glass crown for the Tower's role as home of the Crown Jewels.
