I myself recall most vividly standing by the side of two graves, which were beautifully maintained, on a small island off the west coast of Scotland, where a fighter plane had crashed during the Second World War. We must never forget the sacrifice made by so many.

Poem of the week

The Flanders Field poppy was first described as the Flower of Remembrance by Lieutenant-Colonel John McRae, a Canadian physician and poet, who was professor of pathology at several universities in Canada and the USA before the First World War. He had served as a gunner in South Africa during the Second Boer War and, at the outbreak of the First World War, hoped to join the fighting ranks. However, the powers-that-be decided that his outstanding abilities as a physician could be used to much better advantage in the field, so he was sent to Flanders and later to Northern France as a Medical Officer with the first Canadian Forces. McRae was inspired to write his famous poem after the funeral of his friend and fellow soldier, Lieutenant Alexis Helmer, who died at the Battle of Ypres in 1915. McRae was in charge of a small first-aid post and, during a lull in the battle, he wrote 'In Flanders Fields' in pencil on a page torn from his despatch book. McRae died of pneumonia and meningitis in January 1918 in the British General Hospital in Wimereux, France, where he was buried with full military honours.

In Flanders Fields

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.


On Sunday, baby Olive was baptised in the Chapel of St Peter ad Vincula.
