Poem of the week

The Christmas Rose, written in 1944 by the Anglo-Irish poet and writer Cecil Day-Lewis, is an interesting and, for some, quite challenging poem, especially as Day-Lewis never had any particular religious affiliation. In his early years he claimed to be a Marxist, but was later deeply influenced by his friend and fellow poet W.H Auden, who saw in Christianity a wonderful power to change human lives, having recovered his own faith in 1940. Day-Lewis' experience of the second world war, together with his appointment as Poet Laureate in 1968, made him more moderate and conventional in his views. He went on to become a successful novelist as well, writing 19 crime and mystery books published under the pseudonym Nicholas Blake. He was the father of the actor Daniel Day-Lewis.

In flowerless days,
Making a little blaze
On the bleak earth, giving my heart some cheer?

Harsh the sky and hard the ground When the Christmas rose is found. Look! Its white star, low on earth, Rays a vision of rebirth.

She has been raising funds to support people in Ukraine (her own parents are in a village just outside Kiev) and has personally driven several shipments of supplies to the Polish/Ukraine border. I very much wanted to do something to help Olga and to support Ukraine, and to this end she and I have organised a concert which will involve the Tower choir, to raise funds. Roger has already kindly pledged some support from the Chapel.

The church is a 5min (max) walk from Marden Station, and Marden is 45mins on the train from London Bridge (every 30mins). It will also feature a presentation on Ukrainian culture and some traditional Ukrainian songs and dance (performed by Ukrainians).
