Poem of the week

Timothy Winters, by Charles Causley CBE FRSL (1917 – 2003).

Charles Causley was a Cornish poet, schoolmaster and writer. His work is noted for its simplicity and directness, often set in his native Cornwall. *Timothy Winters* is one of his better-known poems, first published in the collection Union Street in 1957, and resounds with echoes of the Second World War. Causley said, "People always ask me whether this was a real boy. My God, He certainly was. Poor old boy, I don't know where he is now. I was thunderstruck when people thought I'd made it up! He was a real bloke. Poor little devil."

Timothy Winters comes to school With eyes as wide as a football pool, Ears like bombs and teeth like splinters: A blitz of a boy is Timothy Winters.

His belly is white, his neck is dark, And his hair is an exclamation mark. His clothes are enough to scare a crow And through his britches the blue winds blow.

And he shoots down dead the arithmetic-bird,

And he's not even heard of the Welfare State.
