Poem of the week

Lionel Pigot Johnson was a poet, critic and essayist and is largely remembered for having introduced his cousin, Lord Alfred Douglas, to Oscar Wilde, something he deeply regretted later because of the public scandal caused by their relationship. Johnson's little-known poem *Te Martyrum Candidatus*, written in 1895, takes its title from the line 'The noble (white-clad) army of martyrs' from the Te Deum, and is loosely based on the Latin antiphon from the Magnificat

for All Saints Day. It recalls how the saints, dressed in white raiment (*Amicti stolis albis*), 'follow Christ their Captain whithersoever he goeth', and may also be an allusion to Johnson's conversion to Roman Catholicism in 1891. Last Sunday's anthem used these words in a setting by H.K.Andrews. Both Johnson and Andrews were graduates of New College Oxford.

Te Martyrum Candidatus

Ah, see the fair chivalry come, the companions of Christ! White Horsemen, who ride on white horses, the Knights of God! They, for their Lord and their Lover who sacrificed All, save the sweetness of treading, where he first trod!

These, through the darkness of death, the dominion of night, Swept, and they woke in white places at morning tide: They saw with their eyes, and sang for joy of the sight, They saw with their eyes the Eyes of the Crucified.

Now, whithersoever He goeth, with Him they go: White Horsemen, who ride on white horses, oh, fair to see! They ride, where the Rivers of Paradise flash and flow, White Horsemen, with Christ their Captain: for ever He!
