Poem

This poem is the work of Jay Hulme, a young poet who was brought up to be, in his own words, 'so atheist' that at the age of twenty-three, he had no idea what date in December Christmas Day was. After many years of denial, having been drawn to many churches and cathedrals, he finally admitted in November 2019 that God was real to him.

Soon afterwards, a global pandemic changed the world and all churches were shut. As a result, Jay learned to find God everywhere: not 'trapped in church buildings', but 'in every inch of earth, in the ruined factories and polluted canals' of his city of Leicester. The language of this poem reflects urban decay and deprivation, in repeated consonants, such as 'freezing fear' and 'dust-dark doorways'.

The collection 'The Backwater Sermons' (2021), from which this poem comes, reflects the strange perspective of being what Jay calls a 'Plague Christian'.

Abide with us, Lord Jesus

in the bleak earth, mould-dirt, in the tent and the tenement and the cold corner we found for ourselves

Dwell amongst us in the ashes, in the filth and the fright and the freezing fear of eviction that comes with each knock at the door.

Make your home in the dust-dark doorways of dilapidated factories and dissipated department stores. Our endless prayer: *Come, Lord.* Jay Hulme b.1997
